VICTIM GAS BLAST BURIED AT EMHOUSE SATURDAY MORNING Funeral services for Miss Ada Kate O'Neal, 26, employee of the American Well & Prospecting Co. for a number of years, who met death Friday morning about 7:30 o'clock when an explosion of a stove ignited the W. M. Wilson home, corner North Fifteenth street and West Fourth Avenue, where she had an apartment, were held at Emhouse Saturday morning at 10 o'clock. Her charred body was discovered by firemen after the blaze had been practically extinguished. It had been thought that she had already left the house. She was well known here, and was an active member of Corsicana Business and Professional Women's Club. Residents of that section were startled by the blast that knocked windows out of the Wilson home and shook houses in the vicinity. The body was taken to the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. J.T. O'Neal at Emhouse Friday afternoon. The funeral was held from the Emhouse Baptist church with interment in the Pattison Cemetery. The services were conducted by Rev. P. Martin Baker, pastor of the Third Avenue Presbyterian church in Corsicana. Active pallbearers were Ernest Newman, Ed Rittersbacher, Elmer Rittersbacher, Elliott Johnson, Pete Hook, Roy Bristow and M. J. W. Baker. The Sutherland Funeral Home had charge of the funeral.

BLAST KILLS YOUNG WOMAN

EXPLOSION RESULTS DEATH MISS O'NEAL W. M. WILSON HOME BODY IS BURNED BEYOND RECOGNITION; FUNERAL SATURDAY, EMHOUSE

Miss Ada Kate O'Neal, aged 26, lost her life in a fire that followed, and explosion in the home of W. M. Wilson, at the intersection of West Fourth avenue and North Fifteenth street, about 7:30 Friday morning.

Residents of that section of Corsicana were awakened and aroused by a blast that threw glass from the damaged house across the street and which shook houses for several blocks. City Patrolman Marion Griffin had halted for a stop signal at the intersection of Third and Fifteenth and saw flames shoot from almost every window in the house.

Assist People From House.

He ran to the Wilson house shouting to some of the members of the family of Dr. J. W. Bergin across the street from the fire, to turn in the alarm. He was joined by one of the neighbors and immediately they assisted Mr. and Mrs. Wilson from the flaming house, and when they were assured there was no one else in the house, closed all openings possible to prevent spread of the flames.

Patrolman Griffin said after the fire that he started into the room in which Miss O'Neal's body was found, but the room was a mass of flames and having been assured that no one else was in the house did not enter because he feared that the flames would spread to other rooms more rapidly.

The flames were soon extinguished and a majority of the furniture removed from the house undamaged except for a small amount of water. Fire Chief Keith estimated damage to the house at \$2500 with \$7500 insurance and loss on the furniture at \$1,000 with insurance of \$3,000.

BLAME LEAKING HOSE

Extensive investigations made during and following the fire, have led fire department officials to believe that a leaking rubber hose connection allowed the room to fill with gas overnight, and it exploded when Miss O'Neal started to light a fire on arising early Friday morning. The gas had been turned off at a small heater but not at a wall opening. A thorough test for other leaks in gas lines failed to disclose and other cause for the blast.

Miss O'Neal was born and reared in the Emhouse community, but had made her home in Corsicana for several years, and recently at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Wilson. She had been employed in the office of the American Well and Prospecting company for several years, and had an enviable reputation for initiative and efficiency. She was a member of the Corsicana Business and Professional Womens Club.

Funeral Saturday.

Her body was carried to the Sutherland Funeral Home, where it was prepared for burial, and then taken to the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. J.T. O'Neal at Emhouse, about 3 o'clock Friday afternoon.

Funeral service will be held from the First Baptist Church in Emhouse Saturday morning at 10 o'clock with interment in <u>Pattison Cemetery</u>.

Surviving are her parents; two brothers, George and "Bud," both of Emhouse; and three sisters, Mrs. Tommie Hatley of Dallas; Mrs. Evridge Steen and Mrs. Will Sharpley, both of Emhouse. Justice of the Peace J. L. Cox viewed the body and returned a coroner's verdict of death by burning, accidental.

W.C. "Bud" O'Neal was born in 1915 at a formhouse two miles east of Emhouse Texas. The last of eight children, Bul moved with his family to "the big house" on the outskirts of Emhouse, where he attended school and the First Baptist Church. He worked at his tather's form and cotton gin, was a star baskethell, baseball and track player for the Embasse Pirates, and graduated from EHS in 1933. He worked his way as a cock through Toxas A&M, receiving a B.S. in 1439. He went to work for AAM, eventually becoming State Bee Inspector, While traveling for AAM he dated Jossie Standard of Lampasas, and the second time he saw her they were engaged. Marriel in 1940, they celebrated 50 years together. They had three children: Bill (1942), Judy (1944), and Mike (1952). Bull served in the U.S. Army during World War II, worked in the Soil Conservation Service, owned a farm retail store for a quarter of a century, and worked as an inspector for A4M. He spent most of his abolthood in Corsicens, where he was active in Masoney and community affairs.

Jessie Lucille (Standard) O'Neal March 11, 1918 - May 24, 2002

As we celebrate the life of **Jessie Standard O'Neal**, we thought it would be appropriate to relate some things about her <u>early</u> life that might be of interest, especially to her longtime Corsicana friends and in-laws who met her <u>after</u> she moved here as a young bride.

She was the 6th of 8 children.

She was named after her grandfather, Jess Standard, a cowboy who drove cattle up the Chisholm Trail from Lampasas County in the 1870s.

Her father was the fire chief in Lampasas, so she grew up in the fire house.

He trained and sold horses on the side, so she had her own pony from the time she was a little girl. She stopped riding when she was in her mid-30s, but when she was <u>75</u>, she <u>insisted</u> on riding a spirited young quarter horse {tongue-in-cheek} that I owned. I helped her up and gave her the reins, but gosh, I was worried she might fall off and hurt herself, so I held the bridle and stayed close. Well. She {indignantly} said to me, "Get your hands <u>OFF</u> my horse and let me ride"!

As a little girl she was a <u>live wire</u>, a real ball of energy, so in self-defense her mother started her in the first grade at the age of 5!

She took dance lessons as a young girl and later taught tap, and continued to do shuffle steps until just a couple of years ago.

As a young lady she <u>loved</u> to dance and party, and later she enjoyed watching Lawrence Welk on TV, because several times she had danced to his little band early in his career.

She learned to swim at a spring-fed pool in Lampasas. This park was called the Hostess House, and there was a bath house by the pool, with a slightly slanted roof. She and her daredevil friends would climb up on this roof, and delighted in jumping off the roof into the pool! (And they had to <u>run</u> to make the jump, as there was some distance between the edge of the roof and the pool.)

At Lampasas High School she had a great time as a cheerleader and editor of the school newspaper. In fact, she had <u>such</u> an enjoyable senior year that she deliberately flunked her best subject, English, so that she could have a <u>SECOND</u> senior year with the kids of her age (she <u>had</u> started a year early!).

There was no money during the Depression for her to go off to college, so after her <u>TWO</u> senior years, she stayed at home, working for a power company and as a reporter for the Lampasas Leader.

After about three years of this she accepted a blind date with Bud O'Neal.

He was an Aggie who had gone to work after graduation as the state bee inspector for Texas A&M. He traveled constantly, and when he worked bee hives in Lampasas he participated in this blind date with two other couples. Then he left town the next day, and Bud & Jessie had <u>no</u> contact for the next <u>5</u> months! No cards, no letters, and certainly no phone calls – people just didn't call long distance much in those days.

But in April 1940 he returned to Lampasas and called Jessie for another date, with those same two couples. Ten minutes into the date, they were in the back seat and he leaned over and whispered "Let's get married"! She said it scared her to death! About ten minutes later she said "Okay", and this scared him to death!

The other two couples spent the rest of the evening trying to talk 'em out of it, but they were SMITTEN with each other. {Mother always said that she fell in love with his "crooked smile", the very first night.}

Amid predictions of disaster, they were married the next NIGHT, and 50 years later they celebrated their Golden Anniversary!

Now, as soon as she married, Jessie quit her newspaper job to travel with her husband. They lived in hotels and ate in restaurants, and she did not cook or clean or make beds, ever, during this 2-year honeymoon! Then the day before their second anniversary I came along and the honeymoon was over!

She spent the rest of her life as a homemaker. She was utterly devoted to her family. She centered her life around us, but her love included nieces and nephews and in-laws, and later grandchildren, and even a great-granddaughter.

{Our friends were always included in this love as well.}

Then during more than a decade as a widow, she continued her sheer joy for life. She <u>reveled</u> in her role as family matriarch, and she was a lively and generous GRANNY O.

She loved gossip!

She liked to hear it, and she liked to share it, and she liked to analyze it. But really, she just wanted to know what was going on in the lives of her family and friends! That was her world!

She was the essence of tolerance – she tried to get along with everybody, and was a complete success.

But most of all, she was the embodiment of <u>love</u>. It was the overwhelming element of her nature. She extended love in full measure. She gave of herself constantly.

And now that she is gone, we will miss her love. But we will remember countless expressions of her sweet and loving nature.

When illness struck her last year, she faced it <u>bravely</u>, with her usual upbeat attitude, determined to make the best of this situation. She remained unfailingly pleasant and optimistic. She <u>never</u> complained.

A part of her positive nature was her lifelong religious faith – an unquestioning belief in God.

And a few weeks ago, with complete conviction, she declared, "I'm ready to go to heaven".

My sister Judy was her daily caregiver in Lampasas for the last 10 months. {Later, MRO mentioned again Judy's loving devotion and care for our mother, "if anybody ever repaid a parent for all they did for them, it's Judy", which prompted a spontaneous and well-deserved touching round of applause.}

Recently Judy and I were marveling over the way in which she reacted to this <u>cruel</u>, progressive disease.

We reflected that during our early years she had taught us a great deal about how to LIVE.

But during these past several months she taught us how to DIE -

with uncomplaining courage,

with serene dignity,

and with Christian grace.

Today we come to celebrate the life of Ellen O'Neal Sharpley, a bright star in God's creation, who stayed positive and encouraging to the end.
